PRAYER OF THE MONTH (for Easter)


Almighty Father,

FROM THE RECTORY

The Road Map

Dear friends,

It was over a year ago that we had the first Covid 19 lockdown. Our first Sunday services to be cancelled were Mothering Sunday services on 22nd March 2020 and of course all Easter Sunday services in April were cancelled in churches and cathedrals across the UK.

This year we will still be in a gentler lockdown at Easter, but some churches will not be able to have their usual Easter services, because the church buildings are not big enough to seat their congregations safely observing the regulation 2 metres distancing.

One or two of the clergy in our area – the Edgmond & Shifnal Deanery which has 24 parish churches – are planning to have their Easter services outside in their church yards. But this relies very much on dry weather – and April is known for its “April showers”.

Wedding couples are still not 100% sure about their plans for a 2021 service and reception. The government’s “road map” may be like the G K Chesterton poem “*The Rolling English Road*” which I quoted last month about the unexpected twists and turns of country lanes rather than a straight road. Step 2 of the government’s plan is described as being ‘no earlier than April 12th’ depending on infection rates. If things are better, weddings can increase the number of guests from 6 to 15 at their service and have a reception for those 15 guests which is not presently permitted. (It is not yet known as I write this in mid March whether 15 includes the bride and groom).

I expect that we all still have to wear masks in church and discouraged from singing (because of the aerosol factor). At Easter Services we traditionally have the last hymn ‘*Thine be the glory*’ but there is no way we can sit in church and hear the tune and not want to jump up and sing out loud.

The Easter Gospel stories tell us that at first the risen Jesus met Mary outside in the garden. That may need to be the pattern for us this Eastertide.

LOCAL ELECTIONS

The Town and Parish Elections will be held on Thursday 6th May 2021. This means that residents of the parish of Beckbury can stand for election in the forthcoming election. If you are passionate about Beckbury and want to help make a difference then the Parish Council may be for you. For further information you can visit www.shropshire.gov.uk . This will give you further guidance about the role of a Parish Councillor and also links to the relevant paperwork.

To be eligible to stand as a town or parish councillor, you must be:

- ! Aged 18 or over: AND
- ! A British citizen, an eligible Commonwealth citizen, or a citizen of any member state of the European Union.

Secondly, you must meet at least one of the following four qualifications:

- ! You are, and will continue to be registered as a local government elector for the town/parish in which you wish to stand from the day of your nomination onwards;
- ! You have occupied as owner or tenant any land or other premises in the town/parish area during the whole of the 12 months before the day of your nomination and the day of election;
- ! Your main or only place of work during the 12 months prior to the day of your nomination and the day of election has been in the town/parish area;
- ! You have lived in the town/parish area or within 3 miles of it during the whole of the 12 months before the day of your nomination and day of election. If you qualify under more than one heading, it is good practice to include all those which apply.

You will be unable to stand as a candidate if:

- ! You are employed by the town/parish/community council or hold a paid office under the parish/community council (including joint boards or committees); or
- ! You are the subject of a bankruptcy restrictions order or interim order; or
- ! You have been sentenced to a term of imprisonment of three months or more (including a suspended sentence), without the option of a fine, during the five years before polling day; or
- ! You have been disqualified under the Representation of the People Act 1983 (which covers corrupt or illegal electoral practices and offences relating to donations). Full details can be obtained online from the Electoral Commission – www.electoralcommission.org.uk.

What to do on the allotment in April

Spring is here, daffodils and bulbs are in flower and soon the trees will be in blossom. Don't be lulled into a false sense of security by the warm sunny days though. On average there are 4 frost nights in April as well as the infamous April showers so don't get caught out. Make sure you protect your newly sprouting plants with a thick layer of fleece if frost is forecast.

Jobs to be getting on with in April

- ! Sow onions, beets, winter cabbage and first carrots
- ! Start succession sowing of peas, beans, lettuce and radishes
- ! Finish planting late potatoes and catch up with earlies
- ! At the end of the month plant cauliflower

Outdoor sowing

- ! Crops to grow outdoors or under cloches include broad beans, beetroots, Brussel sprouts, summer cabbage, leeks, hardy peas and radishes
- ! Celery – sow seeds in pots in the greenhouse during March/April to plant out May/June
- ! Put up runner bean poles and start supporting the growing peas with netting
- ! Prepare seedbeds for outdoor sowing of main crop veg next month
- ! Tomatoes are easy to grow from seed sown indoors in warm conditions. Sow from late March to early April if you plan to grow the plants outdoors. If you'll be growing your tomatoes in a greenhouse, you can start sowing earlier, from late February to mid-March. Sow in small pots filled with seed compost, then either place in a propagator or cover each pot with a clear plastic bag and place on a bright windowsill. The young seedlings need to be kept at around 18 °C (64° F). Transplant into 9cm (3 ½") pots when two true leaves have formed.

How about growing some edible flowers, they look amazing amongst the vegetables. They are also great for encouraging useful predators.....violets, nasturtiums and marigolds are my favourite. Then there is of course the jolly old sunflowers who produce the nectar and seeds for the wildlife.

COLLECT USED STAMPS FOR THE RNIB

If you receive cards and letters through the post at home or at work could you please save the used stamps to send to the RNIB. They will recycle them to generate much needed funds to break down the barriers that stop people with sight loss living life to the full.

Pop your stamps into the collection envelope at Beckbury Community Shop. The envelope will be sent on to the RNIB when it is full.

RNIB accept all stamps: new or used, first or second class, foreign, first day covers, presentation packs or albums. Stamps are sold by weight and raise £20 per kilogramme of stamps, so it's a brilliant way to raise money. Stamps don't need to be thoroughly sorted, but it helps if you can separate them into British and foreign stamps. (Channel Islands and Isle of Man count as foreign). Make sure you leave at least one centimetre of envelope or packaging around each stamp.

SCAMS – Please be aware of the latest SCAM

Received a phone call from BT informing me that he was disconnecting me because of an unpaid bill. He demanded payment immediately of £31 or it would be £118 to reconnect at a later date. The guy wasn't even fazed when I told him I was with Virgin Media, allegedly VM have to pay BT a percentage for line rental. I asked the guy's name – he gave me the very 'English' John Peacock with a very 'African' accent, and phone number – 0800 0800 152.

Obviously the fellow realised I didn't believe his story, so offered to demonstrate that he was from BT. I asked how and he told me to hang up and try phoning someone – he would disconnect my phone to prevent this. AND HE DID!! My phone was dead – no engaged tone, nothing – until he phoned me again. Very pleased with himself, he asked if that was enough proof that he was with BT. I asked how the payment was to be made and he said credit card, there and then.

I said that I didn't know how he'd done it, but I had absolutely no intention of paying him, I didn't believe his name or that he worked for BT. He hung up. I dialled 1471 – number withheld, I phoned his fictitious 0800 number – not recognised.

So I phoned the police to let them know. I wasn't the first! It's only just started apparently, but it is escalating. Their advice was to let as many people as possible know of this scam. The fact that the phone does go off would probably convince some people it's real, so please make as many friends and family aware of this.

How is it done? This is good but not that clever. He gave the wrong number – it should have been 0800 800 152 which takes you through to BT Business. The cutting off of the line is very simple, he stays on the line with the mute button on and you can't dial out – but he can hear you trying. This is because the person who initiates a call is the one to terminate it. When you stop trying he cuts off and immediately calls back. You could almost be convinced. The sad thing is that it is so simple that it will certainly fool many. By the way this is not about getting the cash as this would not get past merchant services – it is all about getting the credit card details which include the security number, to be used for larger purchases.

Please share this so that your friends and family don't get caught out.

MORE SCAMS

There has been a recent increase in incidents where fraudsters are claiming to be from various police services. Staffordshire Police has received a number of reports of incidents targeting the elderly and vulnerable within our county over the past few weeks.

In this latest scam, fraudsters target elderly and vulnerable people on their home landline telephone numbers and pretend to be police officers. They come across as very polite and often give a name and reference number that can be plausible to many.

These fraudsters usually tell the victims that someone has been arrested and is in custody after being found having stolen money or found to be in the possession of a cloned card belonging to the victim. They will advise the victim to contact their bank to confirm. The line is then kept open as the victims speak to who they believe is the bank. The bank then confirm that the information is true and the victim is asked to visit the bank and withdraw £5,000, a short time later a courier will visit the address and collect the money from the victim. The offenders will phone the victim several times with the calls often lasting hours. They also prep the victims with what to say if the bank question what the money is for.

If you have any elderly/vulnerable relatives or know of any in your local community, please advise them about answering their phones to unknown numbers and if there are any suspicious incidents, then please call Staffordshire Police on 101. **Always call 999 in an emergency.**

Vehicle Tax Scam: Police have been made aware of a scam email which informs you that the latest payment to the DVLA for road tax has failed due to lack of funds. The fraudsters then suggest that your vehicle is now untaxed and you should make a payment by credit card to “avoid any other consequences”.
