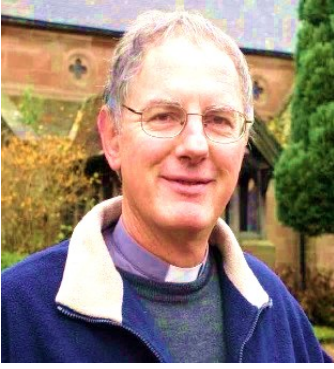
### PRAYER OF THE MONTH (from the Lammas service 1<sup>st</sup> August)

## FROM THE RECTORY

### Curious things

Dear friends

I was reading a library book recently with a passage where a family were discussing a relative's funeral arrangements. One of the family asked what things might they put into the coffin?

This made me think back to the very few times where people have confided in me what they put into their family member's coffin.

Family photographs are I suspect quite a popular item. One family told me they put in a bottle of whisky – “cos he liked a drop before he went to bed”. Another put in some golf clubs and balls, as she was a very good player.

The most curious thing was a family who had put in “a packet of fags” cos he liked a smoke”. I'm glad I did not know about this item – because the funeral was at the crematorium..... Thankfully I was told some time after the funeral, or else I may not have managed to keep a straight face in the service.

Such customs go back a very long way. The ancient Greeks always had to put in a penny to pay the ferryman who rowed the deceased across the River Styx to the netherworld. Archaeologists have found in the tombs of rich Egyptians items such as clothing, beds, chairs, sandals, jewellery, and musical instruments.

In some civilisations weapons were put in the graves of their men, maybe as a sign of their status, but an interesting view on the kind of place they believed they were going to where weapons were needed.

So my question is, which I never ask families making their plans and arrangements, what would you want in your coffin alongside you?

And you might be wondering what I would want in my coffin? Until I wrote this piece I had not given the matter any thought. I am happy to leave it up to my family to decide what is appropriate. It may be that some clergy have a bible with them in their coffins? But given that Christians believe, like St Paul

bibles may well be redundant in heaven (unless we wish to join the long queue to question St Paul on what exactly he meant in this and that verse!

Of course, it's no good putting a bible in my coffin if I am to be cremated!

## **BECKBURY PARISH COUNCIL**

For the past year or so we have been restricted to meeting on Zoom so it was a refreshing change to meet in the village hall again, and what a nice meeting place it now is following the refurbishment.

There have been some changes to the elected officers. David Cummings is now chairman and Peter Gibbins is vice chairman. Sadly Max Breeze has stood down from the Council. Max has, so far as we can ascertain, been a Beckbury Parish Councillor for around 40 years. His knowledge on numerous topics over the years has been invaluable and Max will be badly missed. We thank him for all of these years' service to the Village and wish him well.

The presented elected Parish Councillors are David Cummings, Peter Gibbins, David Tooth, David De Courcy, James Paice and Carl Steventon.

At our meeting on the 14<sup>th</sup> July we heard that Peter Gibbins is heading a group who are investigating the feasibility of setting up a children's play area on the playing field. The cost is expected to be in the region of £35,000. So far grant aid of £10,000 has been received from the lottery community fund. We hope more funds can be raised and if anyone can help or has any ideas for sources of funding please contact Peter Gibbins.

The Parish Council will now meet every other month, usually on the first Wednesday of the month starting promptly at 7.30pm. The first 10 minutes is allocated for public participation. The next meeting will be on Wednesday 1<sup>st</sup> September 2021.

We are now looking to co-opt a new councillor on to the council to replace Max Breeze (big boots to fill). ## LOCAL HISTORY

Following on from the recent football tournament we would like to remind you of a local sporting hero.

William Kenyon-Slaney was educated at Eton and briefly at Christ Church, Oxford.

Kenyon-Slaney was a noted sportsman and played first-class cricket for the Marylebone Cricket Club (MCC), as well as playing at county level for Shropshire between 1865 and 1879. He was also a keen association football player, playing for Wanderers and was selected to play for England against Scotland in the second ever football international on 8<sup>th</sup> March 1873, where he scored two goals. **Kenyon-Slaney became the first player to score in an international football match** as the first international between the two nations in November the previous year had been a goalless draw.

He also took part for the Wanderers on the winning side in the 1873 FA Cup Final and on the losing side for the Old Etonians, in the drawn first match of the 1875 Final and both matches of the 1876 Final.

He fully retired from the military in 1892.

In 1886 Kenyon-Slaney was elected to Parliament to represent the Newport division of Shropshire for the Conservative Party which he represented until his death in 1908. He was buried at St Andrew's Parish Churchyard, Ryton, Shropshire.

## **BECKBURY WI MEETING held on 10<sup>th</sup> July**

Thank you so much for attending the meeting (or showing interest) about a potential WI in Beckbury. I thought we covered a lot of ground and many interesting points were raised and should be considered.

We have planned another meeting on Wednesday 22<sup>nd</sup> September at 7.30pm in Beckbury Village Hall, and I have advertised it on leaflets left in the shop. You will all have had time to think about the pros and cons by then and whether or not you would be happy to serve on the committee. There are many roles – firstly the three that are needed to enable the setting up of a WI – President, Secretary and Treasurer, but also 2 or 3 folk willing to plan and arrange the monthly meetings, i.e. the speaker, activity, etc., someone to be the MCS (Membership Communication System that stores data about members safely and securely, enables members to have access to MyWI website, ensures you receive your copies of WI Life magazine 8 time a year, and enables contact with you from within your own WI) rep, and perhaps someone to set up and manage either a facebook page or a website (or both) for the WI to enable easy contact with other members and to encourage new members to join. The three main roles should be undertaken by three people, but other roles can be combined. A Vice President, an Assistant Secretary and Assistant Treasurer can also be appointed (who can also have another role), but that isn't immediately necessary. None of these roles are difficult and a lot of support is available and trainings or meetings between several ladies in the same role for sharing ideas and experiences are arranged by the Federation. It would be helpful to know before the meeting if you are thinking of offering to be on the committee (that doesn't commit you!!), but it is not vital.

At this meeting it would be great to have a short activity that would give a flavour of a regular WI meeting so please if anyone has any suggestions for this do let me know as soon as possible. It would also be wonderful to be able to offer a hot drink and a biscuit or a piece of cake to everyone to chat over towards the end of the session. If someone would be willing to organise this (perhaps with a friend?) I would be very grateful. Please let me know as I will be at the theatre in Wolverhampton that Wednesday afternoon, so will not have time to prepare refreshments. Expenses would be covered obviously. For regular meetings we would have a rota of ladies (2 working together) willing to sort and serve the refreshments for that evening (this can't be the main officers as they will be involved with their roles during the meeting).

If you have any questions in the meantime, please ask and I'll do my best to answer or to find out the answer if I don't know.

Thank you also for the donations (£25 in total) towards the cost of the hall – that was very helpful. In the meantime have a wonderful summer and we'll meet again in early autumn!! Hopefully we will then be able to set up a WI for us all to join in the fun.

## **BECKBURY ALLOTMENTS ASSOCIATION**

July and August are my two favourite months on the allotment. All that previous hard work pays off with the abundance of amazing vegetables. Too much sometimes and we are faced with a glut of particular crops.....courgettes for one have the ability to transform into the size of a marrow overnight!!!!!!So keep harvesting, freezing, pickling and jam making. I'm trying raspberry and gooseberry gin this year. I made damson last year and it went down very well. Easy to make, just fruit, sugar and cheap gin – shake every few days until the sugars have dissolved. Strain into bottles and keep as long as you can.

This year with the exceptional hot weather, watering is a priority. Aim to water your plants in the cooler hours to avoid evaporation. Lettuce, chard, coriander and spinach are all prone to bolting if they dry out, so always give them plenty too.

Jobs to be getting on with as well as harvesting:

- ! Prune tomatoes 'topping'. This causes the plant to stop flowering and setting new fruit, and directs all the sugars to the remaining fruit. To improve air flow also remove bottom leaves.
- ! Cut back strawberries to the ground
- ! Dry onions and garlic for storing
- ! Harvest main crop potatoes
- ! Prune stone fruited fruit trees
- ! Keep up regular watering
- ! Sow winter spinach, turnips, kohlrabi, chard, radish, winter salad and spring onions. Lettuce is surprisingly hardy and under a cloche or greenhouse it can easily be available for a Boxing Day salad-----far more tasty than any imported variety
- ! Plant out spring cabbage, cauliflower and hardy kale.

Loving the sunshine but let's have some rain.....

## **SHROPSHIRE COUNCIL – ROAD IMPROVEMENTS**

Councillor Steve Charmley – Cabinet member with responsibility for highways

Many of our roads are in poor condition and in need of improvement. You know that, I know that, and so does the council's highways team and our contractors. We all use the county's roads and we've all seen the large number of potholes and other defects. That is why I'm determined to improve the county's roads and make them safer for all road users.

Over the next four years we plan to put at least an additional £40m into our highways maintenance budget, and we are using new technology and new ways of working to help us tackle the problem. We've also made changes to the management of our highways service, as have our contractors Kier. And every day we have crews out across the county carrying out preventative work to prolong the life of our roads – through surface dressing and resurfacing – along with repairs to roads that are already in a poor state. Our aim is to prevent problems occurring in the first place, and to make repairs that will last. I recognise that, in recent times, some of the repair work hasn't been to a high enough standard. This too is changing.

### **Why are the roads in poor condition?**

I am determined to improve Shropshire's roads, but it's important to note that this isn't just a Shropshire problem. Roads right across the country are in poor condition too. I've seen many of them, and we have also been told this by many other councils. Latest Government figures show that 21% of roads in England are considered to be poor – and Shropshire is actually doing better than many other areas.

In recent winters, and especially last winter, severe flooding and snow/ice have had a major impact on the road network across the country. Water gets into cracks in the road, then freezes and expands, and that's why we've all seen a big increase in the number and severity of potholes and other defects in recent months. And that is why we are working hard to repair the roads – but also to prevent problems occurring in the first place.

Of course, we can only carry out the work that our resources allow. As well as a succession of bad winters, since 2008 councils in England have seen year-on-year reductions in Government funding – with highways funding cut by over 50% on average. This has led to a significant deterioration in the condition of roads across the country, especially in Shropshire where we have one of the biggest road networks to maintain in England but receive lower funding per mile than many other councils.

That's why we're planning to put millions of pounds more into highways maintenance and will continue to lobby the Government for more, and fairer, funding for Shropshire.

### **So, how are we improving your roads?**

I know it's all well and good saying that we're improving your roads, but I also know that we need to show you the evidence. Last year we fixed 29,000 potholes and resurfaced 226km of roads across the county. This year we're planning to resurface many more roads. To give you just a few examples, in recent weeks we have resurfaced the A4117 between Ludlow and Clee Hill, carried out extensive maintenance and repair work on the A41 at Prees Heath, and carriageway patching on Huffley Lane near Bomere Heath.

We are currently carrying out our annual programme of surface dressing, with more than 50 stretches of road – covering over 800,000 square metres – being treated to help prevent problems arising in the future. And this year we have been trialling and utilising cutting edge technology to tackle the pothole problem and deliver high-quality road repairs.

In short, I am determined to improve the county's roads and to make them safer for all who use them. I know this will be a challenge but it's a challenge that all councils are facing and one that I'm determined to meet here in Shropshire. This won't happen overnight but I believe that we will start to see and notice this change, as our extra investment in our roads starts to catch up on a long backlog built up over a number of years. It's also a challenge that you can help us with. If you know a road or stretch of road that you think is in need of repair please let us know.
