The last meeting of the Parish Council was held on 8th November 2017.

AED defibrillator – The system for operating the village defibrillator (located at the entrance to the village hall) has been under review. The current system of having a team of volunteers to operate the equipment will be phased out. After consultation with national organisations we have been advised that it is better to have access to all as the equipment can be operated easily. A training/ familiarisation evening will be held in January when the old operating system will be phased out. A BIG thank you to the volunteers for the last 2 years of their commitment!!

NOTE the access code is 2468

Superfast Broadband – Work has commenced on the upgrading to equipment. Currently it is anticipated that the will be complete February/ March.

Grindle – Lorries have again been trying to negotiate the lanes through the village to access RenNew. Obviously this is very annoying but as of March the operations at Grindle Farm must cease as per the Planning Directorate ruling.

From the Rectory

Merry Christmas ?

Dear friends,

I was talking with someone the other day who said they never wished anyone a '*Merry Christmas*' (and it wasn't a descendant of Ebenezer Scrooge !). Rather they wished people a '*Happy Christmas*' which they preferred, as for them 'merry' was associated with too much alcohol ! (and while on this word, let me comment on the carol *God rest you merry, gentlemen* not *God rest you, merry gentlemen* which 500 years ago meant "God keep you strong, gentlemen, let nothing you dismay " It's the same word as Robin Hood and his 'merry' men, who were strong not drunk)

Sometimes we read in Christmas cards *A peaceful Christmas* or *a Joyful Christmas*. It may depend on to whom we are sending the cards !

One thing I prefer is the word *Christmas* written in full rather than *xmas*. though *xmas* is useful shorthand. I associate *xmas* with the commercial, advertising world, which in our present day is the style and focus for many.

X is actually the first letter of the name *Christ* in the Greek alphabet in which the gospels and New Testament were written, so it does have a legitimate place. For me it also nicely represents the element of the unknown in this day and age about what happened at Christmas. Increasingly the 'reason for the season' is becoming less well known as the Christmas story itself is less frequently heard.

Even those who do know the Bethlehem story are hard pressed to make the connection between the baby born in a stable and the Easter story.

St John bridges those two Christian festivals nicely with his words

"God so loved the world that he gave his only Son"

This verse expresses both the identity of the baby born at Bethlehem and hints at his destiny, with the undercurrent of his being given over to death on the cross. There is a mystery here, which X expresses, both in *xmas* and also as the shape of the cross

Thankfully the carol "*O come, let us adore him*" invites us to come and adore him rather than 'come and understand'. While there is an 'X factor' about Jesus the charismatic messiah, teacher and healer, our Christmas services are about worship and thanksgiving rather than analysis and explanation. Come and join in.
