

FROM THE RECTORY

Women, ladies and females

Dear friends

Our new area bishop is a woman, and she will be made bishop at a special service at St. Paul's on 3rd July when three other women will also become bishops, making 22 woman bishops in the Church of England. There are more women bishops in what is called the Anglican Communion, which is the network of "Church of England" dioceses in other countries around the world.

The new Bishop of Shrewsbury, Rt. Rev. Sarah Bullock, will be the first woman bishop in our diocese of Lichfield, where the diocesan bishop is assisted by three area bishops of Stafford, Shrewsbury and Wolverhampton.

There are still members of the Church of England, men and women, including clergy, who are not in favour of women being bishops or priests, and the Church of England made special arrangements for them and their congregations so that they do not have to have a woman appointed as their new vicar, nor have a woman bishop visit them, even if she is their area or diocesan bishop.

The key arguments centre on the gender issues of leadership, or whether women can represent Jesus (who was obviously male!) in the communion service. But as with all controversies where there are two sides, there are arguments in favour of women being priests and bishops, and also criticisms of the arguments used against.

One problem for some people is how to address them when some church members have a tradition of calling their priest *'Father'* (not only a Catholic tradition). *'Mother'* sounds odd, though it is used in convents to refer to the female leader. Over the years there have been some difficulties in talking about women in the church in general. *"We want to thank the ladies of the church for doing the teas"* always sounded strange to me, but I recognise that the words "women" and "female" can also have negative associations in some situations.


Bishop Sarah will be "Bishop Sarah", the same as "Bishop Mark" was her predecessor, and her name is enough to indicate that she is not male (and she will be paid the same as male bishops!). There is a Welcome Service for her in Shrewsbury on 13th July, and I will be at a meeting with her on 9th July.

D DAY 75 COMMEMORATIONS

Between the 2nd and 9th June the Royal British Legion accompanied 300 D Day veterans and their partners/carers (including me and Ron) on a voyage on the MV BOUDICCA to attend the various events which had been arranged to mark the occasion and we were very privileged to be with them. There was extensive TV, radio and press coverage but I would like to tell you a little about the parts which were not in the news;

We sailed from Dover on the Sunday evening after a surprise send off from Rod Stewart singing SAILING and arrived in Dunkirk on Monday morning when those who wished could visit the town. On Monday evening we sailed to Poole Harbour and were welcomed and treated to various military displays.

Sailing again overnight into Portsmouth for the big event on Southsea Common in the presence of Her Majesty the Queen we had to be up at 5am in order to be escorted into the heavily secured area in advance of the arrival of all the VIPS. The TV coverage could not convey the atmosphere of so many veterans spending such a momentous day together.

On the 6th of June we had travelled overnight into Le Havre to be up at 4.30am for a 2 hour coach ride to Bayeux for the ceremonies there. Some of the veterans did the same coach journey on the 7th in order to visit Arromanches and some of the Cemeteries. In addition to the early starts there was entertainment in the evenings from The Royal British Legion Band, the D Day Darlings and afternoon lectures from Peter and Dan Snow. I was amazed at the stamina some of the veterans had, the oldest was 100.

Storm Miguel then prevented the planned return to Portsmouth and we spent Saturday sailing up and down the English Channel in rather rough seas.

There were sombre moments and happy moments, but each and every veteran I chatted to said “We are the lucky ones, we have had 75 years to enjoy our lives, we remember those who died, they were the heroes”.

RYTON & GRINDLE PARISH COUNCIL

The Annual Parish meeting was held on 8th May 2019, Cllr Allan Amey reported on the Council's progress over the past year and confirmed that 3 main areas had been hot topics, namely Planning issues, the Environment and the Parish Plan. The Clerk confirmed that the Parish Council finances were in good order and that details of the last year's accounts would be posted on the Website once audited.

Cllr Mark Dady gave an update on the Grindle House Farm planning and concluded that slow progress was being made with the volume of traffic through the villages reduced, however he asked if the Clerk could invite Cllr Michael Woods (Shropshire Unitary Councillor for Ryton and Grindle) to future Parish Council meetings so that he can keep up to date with the feelings of both councillors and residents.

The Clerk confirmed that whilst refreshing the parish plan over the summer months a door stepping exercise would be carried out and the Parish Council hope to speak with every resident wanting to contribute. She confirmed that this will provide an excellent opportunity for residents to shape their community over the coming years. Councillors will visit properties in person with a short questionnaire.

The meeting was followed by the AGM of the Parish Council where Cllr John Webb was elected Chair and Cllr Sarah Williams elected Vice Chair. Cllr Webb thanked Cllr Allan Amey for his service to the Parish Council and residents over the past years. Cllr Amey has been instrumental in the introduction of the Grounds Maintenance work in the Parish, organising and liaising with the Contractors and has been the force behind the new Noticeboards.

It is great that our community shop has had exceptional community support since its opening in March '18. The shop has now completed a whole financial year and we are therefore delighted to announce details of our Grant Scheme.

What we will fund

The grants panel will consider applications for projects whose beneficiaries live within 2 miles of the shop and the aim of which is to in some way benefit the community.

Who can apply

Community organisations or individuals are eligible to apply for funding for beneficiaries within the qualifying area.

The total grant fund available this year is £3,000; you can apply for any amount up to this maximum.

Who cannot apply

- ! Government agencies or departments of local or state government
- ! Educational, religious or medical organisations, where the application is for the organisation's core business
- ! Businesses

The Grants Panel will consist of at least 2 members of the shop management committee, 2 other shop volunteers and 2 other shareholders. Details of how the panel will assess applications are available with the application form.

The closing date for applications is 31st July 2019.

We will announce grant recipients at our Annual Members Meeting in September.

Sam Swire, the chair of the trust, paid us a visit in April. Beckbury Village Hall trustees wish to record their thanks and appreciation to Sam and the trust for their kind generosity.

This means that we are now very close to having sufficient funds to start phase 1 of the refurbishment project, look out for more information in the next newsletter. We have recently submitted several applications and will keep you fully updated of any further good news.

We have just completed a big sort and tidy and compiled an inventory. We found two items: a large speaker and a light/sound machine. If you own these or you know who does please get in touch to collect them, otherwise we will dispose of them at the end of July.

GARDEN WILLOW WEAVING COURSE



Spaces Still Available!

After the success of the Christmas Willow Weaving course I would now like to offer one for either making various 3D animals from willow, which can be used as garden ornaments, or making structures for the garden.

The day course will be held in Beckbury Village Hall on Saturday 6th July for ten people. I will provide the willow and some equipment. Any beginners will tackle a willow fish that enables you to get the feel of working with willow and then other items can be tried. Those of you who have been on my previous willow course will be able to try (with my support) making an animal, such as a dragonfly, hen, piglet, mouse or pheasant; or a structure such as wigwam, garland or flat fan plant supports, a small bird table or a flower.

BECKBURY ALLOTMENTS ASSOCIATION

Allotment jobs to be getting on with in July.

Well, after the June washout we are really looking forward to July being warm and sunny to encourage our newly planted vegetables. I know us gardeners are never happy with the British weather!

Weeds are going to be a big problem though so hoe regularly to break up the soil and to remove them.

However if it's warm and damp watch out for potato blight.

It's now getting late in the year for sowing and planting but there is still time for lettuces, chicory, endives and other salad leaves as well as fast growing varieties of peas, beetroot and carrots. If you've been harvesting your broad beans, garlic, onions and shallots there may be room to transplant Brussel sprouts, cabbages and cauliflower that you've raised from seed in pots.

If you fancy growing potatoes for Christmas now is the time to plant them.

Many vegetables will be ready now, including beetroot, carrots, potatoes, onions, garlic, peas and broad beans.....if you have a glut then freezing, chutney and jam making can be a great idea as well as drying onions and garlic for storing.

There's always far too many runner beans, they grow quicker than you can eat them, so this year we will be donating some to the Beckbury Shop.

We still have one allotment left so if anyone is interested please ring Gina Somerville-Clark (chairwoman) and she will be able to advise.

Also on behalf of the allotment group, I would like to congratulate Gina and Lee on their recent marriage and wish them much health and happiness.
