.....FROM THE RECTORY

Dear friends,

We are still here !

One or two people are asking (and more wondering) when a new vicar will be coming. The short answer is that we do not know . .

The longer explanation is that that are several procedures and processes to be dealt with. At present the Bishop has encouraged our six church committees to work out a new constitution which will make for fewer meetings requiring clergy attendance, and so, hopefully they say, make the position of vicar here with six churches more appealing.

I moved from full time to half time just before Covid to ease the financial outgoings of the six churches. I was able to do that because I had just started receiving my state pension, so did not suffer too much of a drop in income.

A new vicar will most likely expect and need a full salary (unless their spouse is in a full time job) so the diocese may look to combine the half time position in the Six Parishes with another half time position in the area or in the diocese.

Only after these two things have been agreed and worked out, can a "parish profile" be drawn up, advertising the vacancy and the "job spec". Applicants can then be interviewed and the successful candidate would need to give their present parish(es) three months' notice before moving here.

So we are still here at the Rectory, although I have retired as 'the rector'.

We are sorting out church documents, and getting ready to move in August/September, which leads into the other question people ask us "where are you moving to ? " As we do not own and cannot afford to buy a house, we are able to rent a property from the C of E. With family in south Birmingham we hoped to be given a house there, but with no properties or vacant houses in our preferred areas, we have agreed to move to a house in Erdington which is north-east of "Spaghetti Junction" on the M6. The house looks onto a park but nothing like our present view across to Patshull Hall and Pattingham.

So the short answer to when will a new vicar be coming is still "we do not know"

UNDERSTANDING DEMENTIA

An extract from the book – What I Wish People Knew About Dementia. By Wendy Mitchell.

When it comes to food, our likes and dislikes are so closely linked, with our personality that I can understand why if you take those preferences away from someone, you strip them of their character a little. I recognise that it would be impossible for care staff to take orders from each person individually. I also know that someone like me, who eats the same food day in, day out, sometimes for months, would be frowned upon- that I wouldn't be deemed as having a varied diet. But what's the alternative? If I were in a care home and was served up something I didn't like, or something that didn't taste nice, I would refuse to eat it. Then I would perhaps be labelled as a difficult patient, instead of anybody trying to get to the heart of why I couldn't eat it: could it be the taste? The plate it is presented o? Or the fact that the motor skills required to cut it up make it just too difficult to navigate.

Added to that, different variations of dementia affect people in different ways. For people who develop problems swallowing, eating might become so stressful that they would rather avoid it altogether. These people might also be seen as difficult for refusing food, when in fact a speech therapist might be able to help them, or a dietician might know what foods would be easier to swallow.



HISTORY OF SUTTON MADDOCK

Sutton Maddock is mentioned in the Domesday Book as Sudtone. It was probably part of Iteshale (Shifnal) and the name Sudtone means "south town". The Maddock was added in the 13th century, and has Welsh connections. Sutton was granted by Henry II to Iorweth Goch (son of Haredudd ap Bleddyn ap Cynfryn, the ruler of Powys) in recognition of interpreter services between England and Wales. Sutton passed to Madoc, the son of Iorweth Goch, but it is believed that it was a later member of the family, also named Madoc, who gave his name to the parish – though a communion chalice which is owned by the church and dated 1662, calls the parish "Sutton Maddox". This later Madoc was a man of note who took a great part in the business of the County, although perhaps he was not so interested in Sutton itself as he sold it to John le Strange, the third Baron of Ness and Cheswardine.

In 1186/7, ecclesiastical rights to the parish were given by Madoc to Lord of Sutton to Wombridge Priory. This was sanctioned by the Bishop of Coventry in 1206. In 1291 the Prior of Wombridge received £3.6s.8d per annum in tithes.

In 1871, Sutton Maddock was described as a village, and Brockton as a township. Today, Sutton Maddock is a dispersed parish. It consists of Sutton Maddock itself, bisected by the A442, Brockton (which is about the same size as Sutton Maddock), Sutton Wood and Sutton Common, together with some more outlying areas with small populations. The total population of the parish is around 300.

The Church Building

The original church may have dated from as early as the 11^{th} century, though this may have been a chapel annexed to Shifnal. The present church building dates largely from the 19^{th} century. It replaced a previous church built in the 16^{th} century. The only remaining part of the 16^{th} century building is the tower. The remainder of the church was pulled down and rebuilt in 1887 at a cost of **£2,528**.
