

FROM THE RECTORY

On yer bike

Dear friends

With a little more free time on my hands than I had last year when I was full time, rather than this year when I have reduced my post to half time, one thing I can now do, especially if it is raining, is watch some of the cycle races on ITV4.

Recently it was the Tour de Yorkshire. While I do not know the teams and their colours nor many of the riders (unlike my knowledge of F1 teams and drivers) I enjoy the countryside that they ride through. It is similar with my watching some of the Augusta Masters golf; I do not play golf, and am not a big fan, but the birds and trees and fairways of that course are to my mind worth seeing. Likewise I enjoy the Yorkshire countryside and villages.

Later in the summer there will be the Tour de France and the Spanish Vuelta a Espana and the Giro d'Italia all of which provide good coverage of their landscapes with their historic villages and buildings for their national tourist boards.

Locally of course our views about cycling may be influenced by riders who use our lanes for training and in their groups slow a number of us down because there are few safe stretches of road for us to get past them. Very recently we had an incident of riders ignoring a Give Way and coming out straight in front of us.

There seem to be a growing number of riders on our roads, and since the success of British racers, like Bradley Wiggins, Chris Froome and Geraint Thomas people seem to have been inspired to get on their bikes and get out cycling. Where I live in Beckbury means that I see quite a lot using the Burnhill Green, Badger and Beckbury Lanes – and if I am outside I hear them as well because their cycling helmets mean they have to shout their conversations or directions.

It has been years since I was on a bicycle, and the only time I went out with a friend who was a regular keen cyclist, he lent me a “fixed gear bike” when we went out, which meant there is no chance to “free wheel”. I got cramp in my calf muscle, and have never rushed back onto a bike since. While it may look good for clergy to travel to church on a bike, I am not sure I could do it in a cassock, or with my things in a suitcase or rucksack.


I will keep to the country footpaths for my hill walking, where there is no traffic, lots of fresh air, and peace and quiet at the slower pace of walking rather than riding.

BECKBURY PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met on Wednesday 1st May 2019.

This meeting incorporated the monthly council meeting and the annual General Meeting.

The meeting started with the appointment of the Chair and Vice Chair, Councillor Steventon was elected as Chair and Councillor Gibbins was elected as Vice Chair.

Councillor Gibbins updated the Council in relation to the community shop. The shop had recently completed its first anniversary, which had been very successful, Councillor Gibbins stated that the shop was still looking for more volunteers to help. An advert would be placed in the Parish Magazine with full details.

Councillor Steventon updated the council in relation to the playing fields. He informed the council that the playing fields were in excellent condition and they were used on a regular basis by Beckbury Eagles and Beckbury Hawkes U'10 football teams. Councillor Steventon also wished to extend his thanks to Pete and Reid Glaze for the upkeep of the playing fields.

Below is the Chair's report for 2018-2019:

Beckbury Parish Council May 2018 – April 2019

Another year has passed with Beckbury Parish Council. The Parish Council have continued business as usual.

The Parish Council have agreed several grants throughout the year supporting several organisations and charities such as:

- Beckbury Church £500
- Beckbury Playing Fields £500
- Crucial Crew £20 (which enabled 2 students from Beckbury School to attend the Crucial Crew event)

The Parish Council agreed to keep the yearly Precept the same meaning no further financial cost to Beckbury residents.

We have also had to discuss and hear from residents about planning applications. These have always been discussed in detail and provided some healthy debate between councillors.

The Parish Council agreed to review the Parish Plan and bring it up to date. A small working party was set up and headed by Councillor Paice. It is hoped that this will move forward quite quickly, and the Parish Plan will reflect the residents' views.

There are plans in place for the renewal of white line markings. We are expecting Shropshire Council to attend in this current financial year.

The parish strives to enjoy several positive attractions in the village such as:

- Beckbury Playing Fields – The home to two under 10 football teams (Beckbury Eagles and Beckbury Hawks)
- Beckbury Community Shop – The shop has just celebrated its first year and continues to go from strength to strength. I would like to pass on our thanks to all involved and wish them continued success
- Beckbury Show – The show goes from strength to strength with over 5,000 people visiting our village to attend one of the biggest shows in the area in the yearly calendar. The parish benefits from money raised from the event.

We look forward to a fruitful and successful 2019 – 2020.

GARDEN WILLOW WEAVING COURSE

After the success of the Christmas Willow Weaving course I would now like to offer one for either making various animals from willow, which can be used as garden ornaments, or making structures for the garden.

The day course will be held in Beckbury Village Hall on Saturday 6th July for ten people. I will provide the willow and some equipment. Any beginners will tackle a willow fish that enables you to get the feel of working with willow and then other items can be tried. Those of you who have been on my previous willow course will be able to try (with my support) making an animal, such as a dragonfly, hen, piglet, mouse or pheasant; or a structure such as wigwam, garland or flat fan plant supports, a small bird table or a flower.

The cost will be £30.00 per person, which will cover the hire of the village hall and the willow. I will give my time free! Please get in touch as soon as possible if you are interested and I will provide further details.

BECKBURY ALLOTMENTS ASSOCIATION

June on the allotment: The risk of frost has passed now and temperatures are rising. May has been a surprising warm month. Sorry folks but we really do need a few good days of rain for our newly planted vegetables. June is one of the busiest and most exciting months in the allotment year.....sowing, planting, harvesting, weeding and watering can soon get on top of you so allowing yourself an hour or so a day certainly can help.

- Harvest: Broad beans (over wintering variety), spinach beet and chard, peas, asparagus, globe artichokes, over wintered onions, early potatoes, lettuce, radishes, mix salad leaves and spring onions
- Plant brassicas, aubergines, peppers, chillies, outdoor cucumbers, courgettes, marrows, pattypan, French and runner beans, asparagus, peas, celery, summer squash, sweetcorn, Florence fennel and sweet potatoes
- Keep weeding and mulch with compost. Mulching will suppress weeds and keep the soil moist.
- Earth up potatoes
- Water if dry. A good soak once a week is better than a daily sprinkle. This will help the roots grow deeper to find water.
- Feed tomatoes when you see their first little tomatoes forming. Use high potash feed. A comfrey feed is perfect for this.
- Protect your brassicas from pigeons, keeping them netted.
- Pinch out side shoots of your tomatoes and keep an eye out for pests.

With 21st June being the Summer Solstice there's plenty of daylight to let us get on with all our allotment jobs. The rewards.....well there's nothing quite like the excitement of harvesting your first new potatoes, popping open a pea pod and the taste of your first juicy strawberry.

We still have a few allotments available, so if any of you fancy having a try at growing your own veg please ring Gina Summerville on 07795625316, she will be able to give you more information.
