FROM THE RECTORY

UK War Graves

Dear friends,

Many of us have seen film and photographs of the war graves in Europe; huge areas of white marble headstones in rows stretching across neatly manicured cemeteries, commemorating those who died in the Great War 1914 – 1918. Many who died could not be located or identified, and their names are on the central memorials such as the Menin Gate at Ypres

The Commonwealth War Graves Commission is undertaking a national project to erect war grave signs at church yards and cemeteries here in the UK. Many of those who are buried here are servicemen who died in training, or while being treated in hospital from wounds suffered in action. There are also several monuments to those who died for whom there is no known grave – such as those lost at sea or the crews of aircraft shot down over enemy territory.

We have five war graves in our local church yards: at Stockton (2); Sutton Maddock; Kemberton and Badger. Each church council is presently discussing the proposals to have a sign at the entrance to the church yard indicating a war grave can be seen there.

Occasionally some interesting questions arise; at Badger we have a war grave but the name is not listed on the war memorial in the church. One name on the Stockton memorial can also be found at Sutton Maddock and at Worfield memorials

We are grateful to Graham Jones, the president of our local Royal British Legion Apley Park Branch, who has done a lot of research on some of those from the local communities who died in World War 1, and who has published several leaflets about them. He will be sharing the stories of those whom he has recently researched at the Stockton and Sutton Maddock Remembrance Day services.

In those services we read the names of those on our local parish memorials, and so continue the tradition of “remembering” them. Poppies are available from volunteers and in shops and pubs, as a way of raising funds for those who still suffer as a result of recent conflicts.

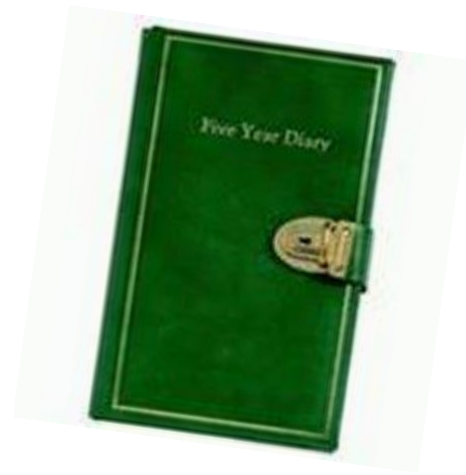
One part of the Act of Remembrance is the saying of the Kohima, words attributed to John Maxwell Edmonds (1875-1958), an English Classicist, who had put them together among a collection of 12 epitaphs for World War One, in 1916. The memorial remembers the Allied dead who in 1944 repelled a Japanese army in India

BECKBURY PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met on Wednesday 4th October. We were pleased to be joined by our local Beat Officer PC Jess Hindley and Mick Simpson (Police Crime Prevention Officer). We were informed that there had been several Car Key Burglaries around the Shifnal area. Please ensure that when you lock your vehicle at night you ensure that your keys are secured within the house and out of sight. This will help deter would be burglars.

Following on from last month's input on Smartwater Mick Simpson gave us a more in-depth talk and some crime prevention advice. It appears that the biggest issue that the Police have with recovered property is trying to track down the owners due to being hard to identify where it came from. There are websites that you can register with and upload details of your property, including photographs and serial numbers etc then if your property is stolen and recovered by the police they can check serial numbers, photographs etc against the websites. One such website is www.immobilise.com. Please check it out.

Mick then gave us a talk on Smartwater. This is a liquid that you use to mark your property and it is unique to your address. It is very similar to DNA/Fingerprints where no two are the same. It is a very simple process, mark your property, fill in the form and it will be registered on the national database searchable by all Police Forces. Smartwater is invisible to the naked eye and can only be seen under UV light.

The parish council have decided to purchase Smartwater for every household in the village. You do not have to take up this option if you don't wish to. We will be arranging a presentation and demonstration of Smartwater in the village hall very shortly. We will ensure that all residents are aware for the date and encourage as many as possible to come along. The parish website will also be updated with further information, www.beckburyparish.co.uk.

We also had very exciting news in relation to the Community Shop. Councillor Gibbins informed us that the funding had been secured and the order had been placed for the shop's structure. Work on the foundations would begin within the next couple of weeks with the shop hopefully being erected before the end of the year. The council asked Councillor Gibbins to pass on a big thank you to all those involved in making the Community Shop become a reality.

We have also received complaints again about vehicles parking on the footpath by the telephone box in Caynton Road. Vehicles are completely obstructing the pavement stopping pedestrians from using the footpath. Can we please ask that you consider others and not block the pavements?

The next Parish Council Meeting will be Wednesday 1st November at 7.30pm in Beckbury Village Hall.

Beckbury village to open Community Shop

Beckbury Village is set to open a community shop early in the New Year. Residents of Beckbury and the surrounding villages were told at a meeting last Wednesday night that thanks to a generous grant from The Prince's Countryside Fund, their ambition to open an entirely volunteer run shop in the village could finally be realised. For the past three years villagers have been working to achieve this goal which they hope will bring new life into the community. As well as selling local produce and basic provisions the shop will serve light refreshments and act as a community hub for local residents and visitors, including the many cyclists and walkers, to the village. Funds have also been raised by the sale of community shares. Over sixty volunteers to run the shop have already been recruited.

“Hearing that we had been successful in our application for a grant from The Prince's Countryside Fund was excellent news” said Management Committee Chair Peter Gibbins. “We feel that the shop will be a real asset to the community reducing isolation of older people and young parents in particular, at the same time supporting local producers and reducing our carbon footprint. We will no longer have to make an eight mile round trip to the nearest grocery shop”. The shop committee are still selling community shares at £10 each and are also looking for more volunteers. The Prince's Countryside Fund was established by HRH the Prince of Wales in 2010. It exists to improve the prospects of family farm businesses and the quality of rural life. The Fund provides more than £1.2m in grant funding every year to projects across the UK that help to provide a secure future for the countryside.

BECKBURY ALLOTMENTS

Autumn leaves are falling fast and with all this wind we've been having it's most important to keep on top of them in the garden and on the allotment. Clear paths for obvious slippery reasons and lawns too as they can cause damage to the sward. Collect leaves and keep in a wired frame to make leaf mould and use as a mulch.

Other jobs to be getting on with in November

- With no time to rest there is just enough daylight to clear and tidy the allotment of any old crops. Don't just leave the remains of old crops to rot, they will harbour pests and disease. Wait for a clear sunny day and go for it. You will feel shattered but a lot better for it.
- Sow a crop of your favourite round seeded hardy peas. They can be sown straight into the ground if weather conditions are favourable, or 3 in a pot to transplant later when the roots have reached the bottom of the pot.
- Stake Brussel sprouts and sprouting broccoli to prevent them from being blown over
- Insulate your greenhouse. Horticulture fleece or plastic bubble wrap is excellent. Also your pots to protect the roots of your precious plants.

Advice given on how to understand heating controls, energy bills and save energy is also given, as well as an assessment for grants.

BECKBURY TRAIL

“Are you the fastest in the parish”?

On Sunday 19th November the Beckbury Trail returns to the village, the 5.6 mile mixed terrain race is expected to sell out prior to race day as was the case on previous occasions.

This year we are trying to encourage as many people as possible from the parish to take part. The Parish Council have supplied two trophies, one trophy will be awarded to the first person over the age of 21 who crosses the finish line from the parish and the other trophy to the first person under 21. It is hoped that this will encourage the younger generation of the parish to join in with the race.

Last year’s race was won by Christian Evans in a time of 35:11 with the first female going to Beckbury’s very own Lucie Tait-Harris in 41:43, both of these times were course records. Over the past 2 years we have raised in excess of £3,500 for local charities and good causes, as well as providing over 15 food hampers to local food banks. We hope that this year will be no different where we shall be raising money for local good causes.
